John and his family were watching the evening news on television. The feature story was about three college students who had gone to Africa. They filmed a documentary in Uganda, a country in the middle of a civil war.

Working with the same partner, look up what is meant by the term "developing country." Then choose a developing country. Create twenty cards that illustrate what you think that children your age, living in that country, need and want in order to be happy. Sort out these cards as you did before.
